Jenny Pierce is Wards Solicitors' Managing Partner as well as the head of its acclaimed Wills, Probate and Mental Capacity team.

BRACE Dementia Research Trustee Bio: **Seth Love**

Date of joining the board: June 2022


I trained in South Africa, at Queen Square in London, and at University of California in San Diego, before moving to Bristol, where I am Professor of Neuropathology. My qualifications are MBBCh (cum laude), PhD, FRCP, FRCPath. I have published over 300 research papers, served on the editorial boards of multiple scientific journals, and received several academic awards. I have participated in national and

international reviews of brain banking, and from 2013 to 2020 I was Director of the UK Brain Banks Network. Since 2018, I have been President of the International Society of Neuropathology. My current research, focused on the use of innovative methods for analysing brain bank tissue to study the pathobiology of dementia, is supported by the Medical Research Council, Alzheimer's Research UK and Alzheimer's Society. However, my earliest dementia research activities in Bristol were funded by BRACE, whose support I now try to reciprocate.

New foundations

RACE has always been an unincorporated charity. In a rapidly changing world, however, we have recognised the need to create a different legal structure to protect the charity and those who give their time to run it.

As a result, a new company - BRACE Trustee Ltd - has been created to act as the "corporate trustee" and the trustees have become directors of that company. This provides a more secure framework but does not change the role of the Board or the character or work of BRACE.








Financial performance 2021

his tells part of the story of how the pandemic affected BRACE and how we survived to emerge stronger in 2022.

With community fundraising difficult through much of last year, we were delighted that our income from this source was recovering and up by over 20% on 2020. At the same time, our general donations fell by £20,000 perhaps affected by the rising cost of living. Income from legacies (gifts in wills) was much lower in 2021. As a result, we had our lowest income in many years.

We managed to reduce our operating costs but the big fall in income meant that we needed to use a greater proportion of income to keep the charity going.

The good news is that we have seen a real increase in support this year and are on track to climb back to pre-pandemic levels over the next couple of years.



rom its very beginning in 1987, BRACE has supported the work of the South-West Dementia Brain Bank. Over the past 35 years BRACE has provided core funding to the SWDBB and supported research projects associated with it.



West Dementia Brain Bank

The SWDBB is one of the most important dementia research facilities in the country and its work supports researchers around the world.

Research on brain tissue has played

an invaluable role in helping scientists to understand dementia, thereby supporting efforts to find treatments for dementia.

The founder of the SWDBB was Professor Gordon Wilcock, who also played a key role in founding BRACE. Nearly 30 years ago

he was joined by Seth Love, who later became Professor of Neuropathology and a Director of the SWDBB. In a distinguished career, Seth became a leading figure internationally in the management of brain banks for a range of neurological conditions. He retired last year and has recently joined the Board of BRACE (see page 4), where we are delighted to have the expertise of such an eminent scientist of the brain.

When Seth joined it, the SWDBB was based at Frenchay Hospital. In 2014 it moved to more spacious and suitable laboratories in the Learning & Research building at Southmead Hospital, where it remains today.

Liz is Associate Professor in Dementia Neurology at the University of Bristol and brings a wealth of clinical expertise to the role. She leads the ReMemBr group (Research into Memory, the Brain and Dementia) which has been supported by BRACE since we helped initiate it in 2010. The group comprises neurologists, psychologists and researchers and runs a cognitive disorders clinic focusing on early, accurate diagnosis of dementia.

When asked about her new role, Liz said "I am delighted to work more closely with the Brain Bank. Brain tissue is a vital resource in dementia research. As a clinical researcher I also find the clinical data collected on brains for dementia research participants is immensely valuable.

"My research focuses on early diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease and improving sleep to help prevent or delay Alzheimer's disease.

We have already used data from the brain banks to better understand the link between ApoE genetics, sleep, and dementia neuropathology.

I look forward to supporting this unique and carefully curated resource, spanning clinical and laboratory data to further illuminate the diseases that cause dementia and develop potential treatments."

We would like to say thank you to the committed researchers at the SWDBB, both past and present, and to our supporters for making the research possible.



As with so many families, Andrew's family has been touched with dementia on a number of occasions.

When Andrew's father sadly passed away from a short illness, in May 2021 the family began thinking of ways they could continue supporting BRACE, a charity that was so close to his heart.

His father, Clive Sutton, was an active and healthy volunteer for dementia research projects and strongly believed research really could make the difference. Andrew's 50th birthday challenge felt like the perfect way to remember his father and support a cause he strongly believed in.

Land's End to John O'Groat's is an awfully long way to cycle by yourself, so two of Andrew's friends and mad accomplices, Chris and Stephan were drafted in to take on the challenge.

In mid-June, the intrepid trio set off from Land's End on their 15-day challenge. Whilst the journey is a well known one, it is not one for the faint hearted with beautiful, yet challenging rides.

Determination, grit, and lots of food was needed to take the team from the southernmost point in England up into the northernmost point of Scotland.

On the penultimate night, with energy low, the trio stopped overnight in Bettyhill and went to the local pub for their dinner. Whilst sat enjoying their food, the jukebox started unexpectedly playing the Wurzels.

This may not mean much to some, but the Wurzels are from the West Country of England and the song is famously embraced by Bristol City football supporters.

Don't Forget to Gift Aid!

ift Aid Awareness Day falls on Thursday 6th October 2022. Every year an additional £1.3 billion pounds of funds are given to UK charities through Gift Aid. BRACE receives thousands of extra pounds to fund dementia research, every year, thanks to the scheme.

If you have donated to BRACE in the past four years, or intend to in the next four years, please take the time to fill in the Gift Aid form to really give dementia research an extra boost! Thank you.

What is Gift Aid?

Gift Aid allows UK charities to reclaim an extra 25% in tax on every eligible donation made by a UK taxpayer. Gift aid is a form of tax relief and does not cost the donor a penny.

How do I Gift Aid my donations?

Online donations:

If you make an online donation, you will be given the option to 'tick the gift aid box.' By ticking the box, you are confirming you are a UK taxpayer. Gift aid will then be automatically added to the donation. Please note that Gift Aid can only be claimed on donations made by individuals and not group donations.

Offline donations:

If you are making an offline donation, be it via cheque, over the phone or in cash you will need to fill in a form to confirm that you are an eligible UK taxpayer. The form will cover all previous donations in the past 4 years and the next 4 years, as long as you are a UK taxpayer over that period. That also means, if you haven't filled in a gift aid form or forgot to tick the box, and you have previously made a donation to BRACE, by filling in the form now, BRACE can still claim Gift Aid on your past donations!

Do I need to fill in a Gift Aid form every time I donate?

No, you do not, once is enough. However, you need to contact BRACE if you have previously filled in a Gift Aid form and are no longer paying tax in the UK. If you are retired and paying tax on your private pension or shares, your donations may still be eligible for Gift Aid.

Gift Aid is a scheme that allows charities to reclaim tax on a donation made by a UK taxpayer, which means your donations will be worth 25% more to BRACE at no extra cost to you.
