## Together We Will Defeat Dementia



Mount Tetnuldi is renowned for its rugged terrain and extreme weather conditions, making it a daunting challenge for even the most seasoned climbers. Voitek faced the mountain's fiercest elements: altitude sickness, relentless winds, bitter cold, and treacherous icy ridges. Despite his training and significant preparation, the mountain had one more challenge in store. As he ascended higher, the weather took a dramatic turn for the worse. Heavy snowfall and increasingly dangerous conditions forced Voitek to make a difficult decision. For his safety and the safety of his team, he was unable to reach the summit and had to turn around after reaching a staggering height of 13,799 feet.

Reflecting on the experience, Voitek shared:

"There was no visibility and the snow was falling heavily. Tetnuldi summit was not for me this year, but I'm still proud that I came, and we pushed for it and we raised a lot for the two charities. As a team we did well and next time, we'll make it happen."

The inspiration behind his challenge comes from his own grandmother, who battled dementia with courage and grace.

Voitek says: "Witnessing her journey opened my eyes to the profound impact of this condition, not only on the individuals it afflicts but also on their families and caregivers. It was this first-hand experience that ignited a fire within me - a determination to make a difference in the lives of those affected by dementia."

An incredible effort from Voitek to raise awareness and vital funds for BRACE and Alive Activities, ensuring that his grandmother's legacy - and the legacy of countless others affected by dementia - continues to make a difference.

### **BRACE** Receives £1 Million Pound Donation

We are delighted to share that BRACE has received a landmark £1 million pound donation to support dementia research across Bristol and the South West. A life changing sum for people living with dementia, for researchers and for a small charity.

This donation will be used in research activities aimed at improving early dementia diagnosis.

Dementia is currently diagnosed too late, with Alzheimer's disease - the most common type of dementia, being diagnosed up to 20 years after the condition has begun. Quicker, more accurate ways to diagnose dementia are greatly needed, so patients can access treatments earlier and plan for their future.

The charity has, in recent years, had a breakthrough in early dementia diagnosis through the development of an early Alzheimer's test called Fastball, which is currently being investigated by the NHS for possible future use. The £1 million donation will be put towards projects such as this one, to make a real impact in the fight against dementia.



Professor in Dementia Neurology at the University of Bristol, Dr Liz Coulthard said:

"Diagnosing dementia and Alzheimer's earlier can offer many benefits to both the patient and their loved ones. Delays in diagnosis can be stressful for families who are left in limbo, knowing something 'isn't quite right,' while being unable to access support and treatment."

"With the development of new dementia drugs, which in the future may be available on the NHS, earlier diagnosis offers dementia patients hope for a better quality of life for longer."

Chief Executive, Chris Williams, says "A £1 million donation to BRACE Dementia
Research will undoubtedly have a profound
impact on advancing dementia research,
not only in Bristol and the South West but
also globally. The focus on improving early
diagnosis is particularly crucial, as it can
significantly enhance patients' access to
new treatments that are being developed,
such as the revolutionary new dementia
drugs."

While we are incredibly grateful for the donation, in 2023 BRACE received almost £3 million pounds of research requests for funding of which we could only fund £700,000. Until a cure is found for dementia, we need to invest as much money as possible into research.

Please know that every single donation is deeply valued and appreciated, regardless of the amount. It is the collective effort of all our supporters, each contributing what they can, that enables us to continue making progress.

Every 3 seconds someone in the world develops dementia.

By the time you have finished reading this article, sixty more people around the globe will have received a dementia diagnosis.

A lifelong diagnosis for a condition without a cure.

To defeat dementia, researchers must first understand the causes of the condition.

Research has shown that dementia is not a natural symptom of ageing, and it is very different to eyesight or knee joints changing in later life.

Getting older is a risk factor for dementia but it is not a 'cause' of dementia.

Studying the causes of dementia will help researchers to one day develop treatments which could slow, prevent or even cure dementia.

## BRACE Research: looking into the causes of dementia

In the past 5 years alone, BRACE has funded more than £1 million pounds worth of research into the causes of dementia. This includes 9 projects which are currently being funded on this specific area.

#### Dr Jeff Davies -Swansea University:

In 2016, BRACE funded Dr Jeff Davies and his research team's work, at Swansea University, investigating the stomach's role in brain health. Their work investigated a stomach hormone called ghrelin and its beneficial effect on cognition and brain function. They found that in patients with Parkinson's disease dementia, levels of a specific type of ghrelin called unacetylated ghrelin, are increased. They think that this might cause the cognitive decline seen in many types of dementia.

BRACE is now funding further research by Dr Jeff Davies and his team, which is investigating if ghrelin could be a possible cause of dementia. Their pilot study is looking at whether the ghrelin pathway can be used to create new dementia treatments.

#### Professor Wendy Noble - University of Exeter:

Recent research shows that brain inflammation plays a key role in the development of dementia.

Professor Wendy Noble and her research team are studying a receptor in the nervous system called P2X7R, which causes brain inflammation. They are investigating how this receptor impacts Lewy body formation, and which types of brain cells are involved.

Since brain inflammation is thought to play a role in many types of dementia, their research could help with more than just Lewy body dementia. If they find this receptor is important, it could support new drug development for many types of dementia.

## Dr Matthew Wright

Hi, I'm Dr Matthew Wright. I am a dentist and researcher working on the MySmile research study in the Bristol Brain Centre.

Prior research has shown the same bacteria that causes gum disease is found in the brains of those with Alzheimer's.

45% of people in the UK have gum disease. What if treating it could slow, or even prevent, Alzheimer's disease?

My top tips for healthy teeth and gums:

- 1. Wait at least 30 minutes after eating before brushing your teeth.
- 2. Toothbrushing only cleans 60% of the tooth, so use either interdental brushes or floss between the teeth.
- 3 If you use a mouthwash don't use it straight after brushing, or you will rinse away the protective fluoride in the toothpaste.





£15 could help researchers store and analyse saliva samples from patients.



**£45** could help fund a specialist computer, increasing accuracy and speeding up research.


Experts in 'all things dementia' attended as exhibitors and speakers. With researchers, health, care, support groups and legal organisations sharing their knowledge with attendees.
